MLA guidelines require the Works Cited page to be arranged **alphabetically** by the author's last name (or title, if no author) and **doubled-spaced**. For organizational purposes and to save paper, those guidelines are NOT reflected here.



Formatting the Works Cited Page:

- Begin your Works Cited page on a separate page at the end of your research paper. It should have the same one-inch margins and last name, page number header as the rest of your paper.
- Label the page Works Cited (do not italicize the words Works Cited or put them in quotation marks) and center the words Works Cited at the top of the page.
- Double space all citations, but do not skip spaces between entries.
- Indent the second and subsequent lines of citations five spaces so that you create a hanging indent.
- Entries are listed alphabetically by the author's last name.
 - Alphabetize works with no known author by their title; use a shortened version of the title in the parenthetical citations in your paper.

Capitalization and Punctuation

- Capitalize each word in the titles of articles, books, etc, but do not capitalize articles (the, an), prepositions, or conjunctions unless one is the first word of the title or subtitle: *Gone with the Wind*, *The Art of War, There Is Nothing Left to Lose*.
- New to MLA 2009: Use italics (instead of underlining) for titles of larger works (books, magazines) and quotation marks for titles of shorter works (poems, articles)

Notes about Online Resources

• MLA no longer requires the use of URLs in MLA citations. If a teacher requires you to include URLs, MLA suggests that the URL appear in angle brackets after the date of access. Break URLs only after slashes.

- Abbreviations are required for missing information in online citations.
 - Use n.p. if no publisher or sponsor is given.
 - Use n.d. when no publication (last updated) date is given.
 - Use n. pag. if no page numbers are given (for a work on the Web that also has print publication data)
